2023-24 Corporate Relocations in the Metroplex

General Dynamics: Mesquite, TX. General Dynamics opened a nonplus-square-foot facility in Mesquite. The company currently employs 150 people
plus-square-foot facility more than 350 people once it is fully operational. This facility opened after the U.S. Congress passed a \$95 billion foreign aid package last year of which more than 60% was allocated to support war efforts in Ukraine.





Lowe's: Mesquite, TX. Lowe's has leased a 78,000-square-foot space for a fulfillment center in the Landmark at the Meadows business park in Mesquite. This facility is expected to handle order processing, packaging and shipping once it is fully operational.

H-E-B: *Plano, TX*. H-E-B, one of the top U.S grocery retailers, has opened a new 55,000-sqaure-foot facility next to its Plano store. This new facility supports H-E-B curbside pickup and home delivery orders in Plano, Frisco, McKinney and Allen, and is expected to hire more than 125 partners.



CoreWeave: Plano, TX. CoreWeave, a New Jersey-based cloud-computing startup, has opened a 450,000-square-foot state-of-the-art data center with an investment of \$1.6 billion in Plano. This new facility is expected to support the company's growing artificial intelligence technology space.





RingCentral: Addison, TX. RingCentral has opened a fourth office space totaling 35,000 square feet in Addison. The location will host the company's customer success and support teams.



McMaster-Carr: Fort Worth, TX. Illinois-based industrial e-commerce and distribution company McMaster-Carr announced plans to construct a new 840,000-square-foot regional headquarters and distribution center at a cost of \$360 million in Fort Worth. Once fully operational, the facility is expected to employ 250 full-time workers.

Hexagon Purus: Mesquite, TX. Hexagon Purus, Norwegian company leading hydrogen and batter energy storage solutions company has leased a 200,000square-foot facility in Mesquite. The company plans to employ more than 250 skilled workers in the new facility.





Gotham Greens: Seagoville, TX. Gotham Greens, a greenhouse farming company, opened a 210,000-square-foot greenhouse facility in Seagoville. The company produces pesticide-free and non-GMO salad greens and herbs. This is its first Texas location.



Standard Meat Co: Fort Worth, TX. Standard Meat Company, a family-owned company based in Fort Worth, is constructing its fifth processing plant near its existing headquarters. The new plant will total 166,000 square feet with cutting-edge technology deployed to drive business growth.

Kinaxis: Irving, TX. Cloud-based supply chain management software provider Kinaxis has opened a new centralized hub in Las Colinas to host employees and customers. The hub is aimed at better serving and supporting the company's growing customer base in the region.





Sysgration: Plano, TX. Sysgration, a Taiwanese-based OEM electronics manufacturer, is opening a new facility in Plano to enhance its supply chain capabilities. The company estimates to invest close to \$16 million and employ more than 150 people in the 98,000-square-foot facility.

Chick-fil-A: Hutchins, TX. Fast food chain Chick-fil-A has opened a new distribution facility in Hutchins to support over 200 restaurants. The 290,000square-foot facility is set to employ more than 225 people.



Omnilife: Allen, TX. Omnilife, a Mexico-based nutritional supplement company, is establishing its U.S. headquarters in Allen. The 90,000-squarefoot facility will feature office and showroom space and is expected to employ over 100 people.





Ballard: Rockwall, TX. Canadian-based Ballard Power Systems announced plans to construct a manufacturing facility in phases in the Rockwall Technology Park in Rockwall. The first phase is expected to cost \$160 million. The company was awarded \$40 million in DOE grants to support the construction of the facility.



Sportec Solutions: *Arlington, TX.* Sportec Solutions, a technology company specializing in advanced match data and officiating technology, has established its U.S. headquarters in Arlington. The company, which has long-term agreements with Major League Soccer (MLS), plans to hire 17 employees.

Crystal Window & Door Systems: Mansfield, TX. New York-based Crystal Window and Door Systems, a leading window and door manufacturer, is set to construct an advanced manufacturing facility and regional corporate headquarters in Mansfield. With an investment of \$121 million, the 600,000square-foot facility is expected to generate more than 500 new jobs.





Collective Health: Plano, TX. Collective Health, a healthcare technology firm, has Collective Health launched its first office in Plano. With 100 employees already on board, the company is set to expand its hiring efforts further.



Hyosung Americas: Fort Worth, TX. Hyosung Americas, the North America subsidiary of the multi-billion-dollar South Korean conglomerate Hyosung Corporation, opened a new 125,000-plus-square-foot distribution center near the DFW airport. The company already has a presence in Irving.

Onsemi: Allen, TX. Onsemi, a prominent semiconductor technology provider, announced plans to invest \$28 million in a new facility exceeding 97,000 square feet in Allen.





Hithium Tech USA Inc: Mesquite, TX. Hithium Tech USA, the U.S. arm of China-based Xiamen Hithium Energy Storage Technology Company, plans to set up a battery energy storage systems facility in Mesquite. The company intends to invest \$100 million and create more than 140 jobs.

Koya Medical: Dallas, TX. California-based Koya medical company is relocating its headquarters to Dallas. The 35,000-square-foot facility is expected to bring an investment of \$1.7 million and create 220 new jobs.



Dick's Sporting Goods: Fort Worth, TX. Dick's Sporting Goods is building a new 800,000-square-foot distribution center with an investment of \$98 million in Fort Worth. The company estimates to create more than 300 jobs.





Big Ass Fans: Fort Worth, TX. Big Ass Fans, known for producing high-BIGASS FANS volume, low-speed fans, has opened a 210,000-square-foot manufacturing facility in Fort Worth. The company and the facility in Fort Worth. The company anticipates creating more than 100 new jobs in the region.



Salcomp: Arlington, TX. Finnish-based Salcomp, a global manufacturer of mobile phone chargers and power adapters, is opening its new U.S headquarters in Arlington. The company estimates that the expansion will create 660 new jobs.

Embraer: Fort Worth, TX. Brazilian aerospace company Embraer is expanding its operations with a new facility at Alliance Airport in Fort Worth. The \$70 million investment is expected to generate 250 new aviation jobs.





Amazon: Cleburne, TX. Amazon has started construction of a \$200 million, 1.7million-square-foot operations facility in Cleburne. The facility is expected to create more than 1000 new jobs.



Delta Electronics: Plano, TX. Delta Electronics is opening a new manufacturing facility in Plano. The company plans to build a 1,000,000-plus-square-foot facility in three phases and create 1,500 new jobs.

Bell Textron: Fort Worth, TX. Bell Textron is expanding its operations in Fort Worth with a new 448,000-plus-square-foot facility at an estimated investment of \$630 million. The expansion will create approximately 500 new jobs.



Speedy Freight: *Irving, TX.* Speedy Freight has established its U.S. headquarters and a 50,000-square-foot warehouse in Irving with a \$1.5 million investment.
